



GROWING PRESSURE ON TRANSBOUNDARY WATERS – YET FEW FRAMEWORKS FOR COOPERATION ARE IN PLACE






- 310 transboundary river basins and more than 500 transboundary aquifers
- TB river basins cover 47.1% of the land surface and host about half of the world's population
- Development, population and climate mean increasing reliance on transboundary waters
- By 2050, 50 to 100% more people could live in water-stressed transboundary basins compared to today
- Shared waters can elicit conflict or cooperation
- Transboundary cooperation key for provision of Global Public Goods like climate resilience, conflict prevention, biodiversity preservation

Around **two-thirds** of the world's transboundary rivers – and many more aquifers - do not have a cooperative management framework

- Regional transboundary programs:
 - Since 2000, \$1.1B programs financed through TFs
 - 10+ donors involved
- Other support:
 - Commissioned by CMU plus ongoing lending
 - Dozen projects in federal rivers
- Technical Support to OP 7.50 and Compliance with Dam Safety ESF
- High level engagement to support initiatives led by senior-most Bank management
